South West Open Championships 2021

Blundell's School, Tiverton, Saturday/Sunday, July 31st-August 1st 2021

STOP PRESS This year's competition was dedicated to the memory of Tim Lewis, who died in June. Ed Kay successfully defended the Singles title he won in 2019, beating Will Ellison in the final. Will partnered Charlie Brooks to win the Doubles against Kay and Dave Butler. In the two Plates Joe Sumner defeated Lewis Keates in the Singles, while Lewis then paired up with Bally Singh to beat Joe and Addie Chai.

Organiser Wayne Enstone reports: This year's 38th Championship was very special in several ways, it being the first Championship for two years and held in memory of Exeter Fives Club Legend Tim Lewis.

Despite having to move the date back we still had an entry of some 32 players, with six players in the top ten of the National Singles Rankings playing in the Singles. There was a mixture of youth and experience, plus National Ladies Champion Louise Mathias, and former National Ladies Double Champions Maddy Raynor and Alexandra Steel — a wonderful mix.

In the Singles first round there were some fine performances considering there has been no competitive play for almost eighteen months. This set the scene for the rest of the day, with young Blundell's sixth-former Ed Swarbrick taking experienced Dan Sorensen to the first three-gamer, to be followed in the second round by Old Blundellian Addie Chai taking Dan Grant to another three-gamer, and a quarter-final where DG had three wonderful games with Tom Watkinson, with Tom edging into his first semi-final at these championships and upsetting the seedings. Another seed upset saw a revitalised Charlie Brooks turn back the years to beat Dave Butler in two hard-fought games for a place in the semi-finals. In the other quarter-finals one felt for Sam Russell as he competed in most rallies with Ed Kay; however, Ed produced endless winning shots to shut the door on that challenge, as did Will Ellison in beating a lively Matt Shaw. Both semis were played after the Doubles semis, which was the players' choice, with Tom Watkinson blasting away against a very sharp Ed Kay, Ed again winning in two entertaining games. Charlie Brooks had his moments of success in the other semi-final; however, Will held off the challenge and came up with his big shots to end what had been a great day of fives in the main competition.

The Doubles began at mid-day, with two three-gamers in the first round, Chris Davey & Dan Sorensen just edging it over the very experienced Nick Geere & Stuart Watson, 11-8 in the third. Cameron Low & Louise Mathias similarly beat Richard Christie & Stuart Kirby 11-7 in the third. All the seeds went through to the semi-finals reasonably comfortably with the exception of Dan Grant & Matt Shaw, who took three games to beat Louise Mathias & Cameron Low. One may have thought Bonfire Night had come early in the first semi, with Tom Watkinson rocketing the ball about against bighitting Charlie Brooks & Will Ellison, Sam Russell playing the back-up role with Tom, with some quite remarkable play; however, Charlie and Will proved too strong eventually and won through to the final. In the other semi, Dan Grant, struggling with a back issue earlier in the day, had a superbly mobile Matt Shaw as a partner, which helped them push Dave Butler & Ed Kay to three games, with Dave & Ed holding steady to win the third 11-6 and take their place in the final on Sunday morning.

The Plate competitions finally started well into the afternoon, which resulted in a very late finish, gone 9 o'clock in the evening. Congratulations go to Joe Sumner for beating Lewis Keates in a real cliffhanger in the Singles final, 16-14. In the Doubles final, Lewis and his partner Bally Singh powered their way to a very convincing win against Joe & Addie Chai 15-3.

RFA President David Parlby came along on Saturday to support and watch, and commented how impressed he was with the high standard of play shown in both Singles and Doubles. David won the South West Doubles back in 1987 — how time flies!

Alexandra Steel very kindly organised the Saturday evening meal for us at a new venue, which proved most successful and was certainly well supported. As usual competitors and spectators could have a good relax and catch up with old friends, making the championships a real social occasion.

On Sunday morning the Singles final began, with Ed Kay wanting to retain his title from 2019 and Will Ellison wanting to win his eighth. Both players attacked each other from the start, winning alternate rallies with the score on love all for the best part of 10 minutes. The quality of play was magnificent. Ed just slowly started edging the rallies with a mixture of his clinical wall shots and deft angles, and at 7-2 to Ed it looked an uphill battle for Will. Despite Will's determination and

excellent play Ed started to dominate the rallies, winning the first game 11-6. The second game presented a similar picture, with Ed looking more invincible as the game progressed. At 2-9 down Will did hold Ed up with a mini-revival; however, Ed managed to hold off Will's challenge and emerged a very impressive winner, successfully retaining his title.

In the first game of the Doubles final Will Ellison & Charlie Brooks hit their usual former National Doubles Championship form, taking a 5-0 lead; however, Dave Butler & Ed Kay eased the score back to 4-6 down. Using their experience Charlie and Will appeared to inject even more pace into their hitting and began to dominate once again and closed out the game out, winning 11-4. The second game was quite the reverse of the first, especially with Dave hitting several winning shots in a row to help take Ed and himself into a quick 7-1 lead. Question for spectators was Would this match be a three-gamer? At this point Charlie Brooks hit a series of blast angle shots that brought Will and himself back into the game, still 4-7 down, only to see Dave and Ed move to game ball at 10-7 and looking set for the win. Not the case in Charlie and Will's minds obviously, as they kept their nerve and after several hard-fought rallies and multiple winning serves they managed to recover to make it 10-all. Unfortunately, the game ended surprisingly quickly as Ed attempted a winning serve that just clipped the board, giving Charlie and Will match point. which they took to win the game 12-10 and seal victory.

Whilst the finals were being played Alexandra Steel organised twelve other players to compete in the fun American Doubles Tournament. After many close games, Alexandra & Matt Shaw took home the local Dartington Glass trophies — well done to them all for holding up after playing every pair, five games in two hours' play — wow!

As usual, Trophy Presentations took place for the Winners and Runners-up. However, it felt this year that all the players who competed were winners in the sense of being back on court at long last. Well done then to all. Another great Championships on and off court. Here's to next year, all welcome.

Thanks go to: Alexandra Steel, our social meal director plus performing multi organisational roles, and to mum Caroline; to Lesley Enstone, Catering Manager; to Blundell's School staff for opening doors, cleaning courts and general administration; to Matt Shaw for entries and publicity and for performing multi-media roles with Sam Russell and Dan Grant, all of which kept those not in attendance informed throughout the two days; finally to Howard Wiseman, via Dominique Redmond, for producing an excellent standard of ball for this year's championships.

The Yorkshire Open Championships 2021

Derby Moor Academy,

Saturday/Sunday, 11-12 September 2021

STOP PRESS Ed Kay successfully defended his Yorkshire Open Singles title but not without a tough challenge from first-time regional finalist Julian Aquilina. Ollie Arnold, beaten by Ed in the quarter-final, went on to win the 2nd Singles Plate, then teamed up with Ed to win the Doubles. Joe Sumner won the 1st Singles Plate, beating Lewis Keates, while Keates & Bally Singh won the Doubles Plate at the expense of Chris Davey & Raheem Yusuf.

Organiser John Hawke writes: Saturday 11th September saw the export of the Yorkshire Open Fives tournament to the courts of the Derby Moor club. Although the move was prompted by uncertainty of the availability of the Giggleswick courts due to Covid, the change of venue also made sense for other reasons. Derby is easily accessible from both London and the North East; with the demise of the Halifax courts few, if any, Yorkshire based players are available; and, historically, the Derby club has provided a large proportion of the entries for the Giggleswick Doubles.

The reward for the change of venue came in the form of the largest entry for many years, with 15 Singles entrants and 10 Doubles pairs. As to the accessibility, players came from London, Durham and even as far away as Devon, with the organiser travelling from Anglesey.

Now to the Fives. Within an hour of the nominal start time some serious Fives was underway. Because of the high number of Derby players it proved impossible to avoid matches between club members, the most notable of which was the hotly contested battle between Lewis Keates and Anthony Goodwin. Anthony finally won after three gruelling games. The remainder of the first round matches were settled in two games, with the star players providing plenty of exercise for those of lesser abilities.

Ed Kay was made to work reasonably hard in his journey to the final, all his opponents scoring at least 7 points in every game. Dave Butler, on the other side of the draw, was uncharacteristically lethargic, maybe due to taking the demon drink on Friday night, and was deposed from his number two seeding in the semi-finals by Julian Aquilina. Julian went on to push Ed to 3 games in the final. Ed eventually won 11-2, 9-11, 11-7.

The plate, for first-round losers, was played as a knockout competition, one game to 15. Again this produced some close matches, with Joe Sumner eventually victorious, having defeated Lewis Keates in the final.

A second plate was intended to include all the first round plate losers, but many of these had already thrown in the towel, leaving a single match to be both first round and final. Louise Mathias beat Vishal Singh 15-7.

To ensure that everyone had their fill of matches as round-robin was also held for cup second round losers. Ollie Arnold dominated with a win in every game. The Taunton medical contingent had a good day!

For the evening a meal had been organised by the Derby lads at a local restaurant. A good time was had by all.

Sunday was doubles day. The highlights of the early round were the three game match won by Law and Suddaby againts Mathias and Hill, and a repeat of the singles rivalry between Keates and Goodwin. Lewis Keates was again on the losing side, him and his partner Bally Singh being beaten in three close games by Anthony Goodwin and Max Frost.

First seeds Ollie Arnold and Ed Kay had an uneventful progress to the final, whereas Butler and Aquilina, the second seeds, were beaten surprisingly easily by Sam Russell and Tom Watkinson in the semi-finals. Sam and Tom's euphoria was short lived as Ollie and Ed beat them in the final 11-0, 11-3.

The plate competition was run as two round-robins of three pairs each. Kirk & Kirby, Mathias & Hill and Keates & Bally Singh formed the first group, with Christie & Vishal Singh, Law & Suddaby and Davey & Yusuf the second. Keates & Singh, as winners of group one, then played Law & Suddaby who came second in group two while Davey & Yusuf played Mathias & Hill. Keates & Bally Singh eventually won the plate final against Davey & Yusuf 15-8.

The presentations at the end of a tiring day were made by the ever-young Bob Dolby. In addition to the usual cups, plates and medallions, Bob had also managed to produce RFA mugs for the doubles plate runners up and a bowl for Louise Mathias as a reward for her victory in the first-round losers singles competition.

All in all a thoroughly enjoyable weekend. The organiser's food calculations were somewhat thrown off by the absence of a certain Bob Sandie, but the excess has found a home at an Anglesey charity. The Derby courts have proved their worth as a tournament venue; the Yorkshire Open may, strangely, have found a new permanent home.

STOP PRESS Will Ellison successfully defended his title from 2019, the fifth time he has won the Singles, and then won the Doubles with Dan Tristao for the sixth time together, making it 9 London Doubles titles in all. In the Singles final Will defied the seeding to beat Ed Kay in straight games, while in the Doubles the unfamiliar pair of Charlie Brooks & Theo Parker defeated second seeds Ben Beltrami & Ed Kay at the semi-final stage before going down convincingly to Will & Dan in the final. Theo picked up the Singles Plate at the expense of Ben Jourdan, while, in the Doubles Plate, Julian Aquilina & James Tilston were too experienced for the new pair of Will Edmonds & Emrys Thursfield in a well fought final.

Organiser Will Ellison reports: We were back to St. Paul's for the 26th London Open, following the absence of a tournament last year due to the coronavirus pandemic. There were familiar names etched again on both trophies, with several new records set — Will Ellison won the Singles for a record-extending 5th time, and with Dan Tristao won the Doubles title for a record-extending 6th time as a pair. Will now holds a record 9 London Doubles titles overall. Will also moved to third in the all-time list of open titles, with 79, overtaking Dave Hebden, while Dan won his 53rd. Some highly competitive Plate matches saw Theo Parker emerge as victor in the Singles, with Julian Aquilina & James Tilston picking up the Doubles title.

I would like to start by thanking everyone who took part in what has become a busy stretch in the fives calendar. In particular, it was wonderful to see several new faces in the open tournament scene as well as so many schoolboys – in particular, Ben Roberts, Ben Harrison and Aiden Whitham of St. Paul's, current U16 National Champion Genesis Nsenga, current U18 National Champion Gwydion Wiseman, plus Oscar McIntyre from the City of Durham Club It was fantastic to have a large contingent of past and present Cambridge University players participating in the doubles and I hope they will return to many more events. Andrew Boyd and Ben Jourdan deserve a specific mention for making the trip down from Scotland – they managed to finish the doubles tournament just in time for their train back!

The tournament commenced on Saturday morning, with the pick of the first round Singles matches being Theo Parker versus Sam Russell. Sam ultimately managed to upset the seedings with an 11-6, 11-2 win to book himself a slot in the quarter-finals.

Onto the next round, and once again Sam Russell was creating headlines, taking a game off top seed Ed Kay, and only losing 11-7 in the decider. It is great to see his fives going in the right direction (maybe all the lockdown running helped somehow!). Other matches of note were between the fourth and fifth seeds – Julian Aquilina and Charlie Brooks, which Julian clinched in two close games, continuing the fine form he showed in the Yorkshire Open. Ben Beltrami and Tom Watkinson had another close two-gamer, with Tom leading 9-6 in the second, but Ben managing to find a way through to take it 11-9. Will Ellison completed the line-up for the semi-finals with a comfortable win over Andrew Boyd.

In the semi-finals, Ed Kay came through against Julian Aquilina more comfortably than in the final in Yorkshire (which had been a 3-gamer), although the second game (11-8) was a close affair. In the other semi Will Ellison beat Ben Beltrami decisively, although Ben was possibly suffering from a long working week and a tough previous match with Tom.

The final was therefore a repeat of 2019, and the result was similar – Will played an extremely consistent game, putting pressure on Ed with relentless side-to-side hitting and retrieving any drop shots with interest. He won it 11-4, 11-3 – very much a reversal of the 11-6, 11-2 win by Ed in the South West Open final. It will be interesting to see how these rivalries play out in the remainder of the season, especially with the return of Dan Tristao now likely for the West of England Open.

The Singles Plate consisted of two groups of 5, with each match a game to 11. After the 20 matches were completed, a final consisting of Theo Parker versus Ben Jourdan ensued. Theo came through 15-9 to clinch the bronze medal.

The doubles tournament commenced on the Sunday morning, with the top four seeds all receiving a bye. The first round had some close and high quality matches, with mentions to Ben Hale and Helena Tunks for their win over Ashwin Ahuja and Holly Nugent by 11-7, 12-11 (a real nail-biting second game!), as well as to Savanna Leboff and Ben Yass for theirs over mother-and-son pair of Julie and Oscar McIntyre by 12-10, 11-6. It was great to see so many mixed pairs taking part, as well as James Toop back playing again, resuming his National Doubles partnership with Gwydion Wiseman.

The quarter-finals followed the seedings, with the exception of Andrew Boyd and Ben Jourdan's good win over Julian Aquilina and James Tilston (11-8, 11-8).

The semi-finals provided one of the shocks of the tournament, with Charlie Brooks and Theo Parker finding top gear to dispatch second seeds Kay and Beltrami by the incredible scoreline of 1 and 0, marked by an awesome combination of consistency and winners. In the other semi-final, Ellison and Tristao came through against Boyd and Jourdan in two games.

The doubles final was a demonstration of ruthless consistency, retrieval and winners from Ellison and Tristao, who won by the comfortable scoreline of 11-5, 11-2 to take the title. Dan's drop shots were often paired with follow-up shots from Will to devastating effect.

The Doubles Plate was another great contest, with 4th seeds from the original tournament Julian Aquilina and James Tilston living up to their billing as top seeds to win and defend the plate title they won in 2019, coming through 11-9, 11-4 against the Cambridge pairing of Will Edmonds and Emrys Thursfield. This was only after a long group stage, with two groups of three playing individual matches best of three games to eleven. Well done to everyone who took part in what was a lot of fives for the day!

The Lady's Cup 2021

Cambridge University Sports Centre Saturday, 16th October 2021

Organiser Bob Dolby reports: 16 pairs contested the annual Lady's Cup competition on the new courts at Cambridge University. There were students from three universities including Cambridge and from three schools, travelling from East Anglia, London, Bedford, Stamford and even Edinburgh. There was as usual a wide range of ages, experience and abilities. A small number were complete beginners, including four very enthusiastic and supportive parents.

The primary purpose of this event, hosted by the Cambridge University Rugby Fives Club, is to encourage women's Fives. The emphasis is very much on gaining experience of the game, on fun and enjoyment rather than competition, though in the later stages of the day, where round robins give way to knock-outs, the intensity of play does increase!

The magnificent solid silver Lady's Cup itself was originally donated by Mrs Malt in memory of her husband Philip "Pussy" Malt, national champion in Singles and Doubles in the period of 1930-35. Philip Malt sadly died in 1937 from TB while at the height of his powers. The Cup was played for by members of the Alleyn Old Boys' Fives Club in 1938 and 1939, whereafter it disappeared during the war and for several decades until it was rediscovered and repurposed for the current competition in 2014.

The day began with 90 minutes of friendly games to help the players get to know each other and acclimatise to the glass-backed courts. After lunch three different groups were set up and scores recorded, from which it was possible to allot players to three separate competitions, reflecting their relative standard.

On one court the Lady's Plate was played out between 4 pairs; on another court four more pairs contested the Lady's Bowl, and on Court One the Lady's Cup involved the 7 strongest pairs. Players from Stamford School dominated the Plate and the Bowl but Cambridge University's Ladies Captain, Tarn Chamberlain James, was eventually in a winning pair. The magnificently well organised and enthusiastic pupils of Stamford ran these two competitions themselves.

The Lady's Cup competition saw Katie Sumner and her father Stuart win their quarter-final against a very young pair from Stamford, Dan and Jasmine; next up master-in-charge Alex Smith and acting Head of Girls' Sport Charlotte Fletcher, playing her first day of Fives ever, beat another pair of youngsters from the school. Both games were close but not so close as the victory gained by Rosa Ogilvie and Louise Hawkins from Edinburgh, who beat Joe Sumner and his mother Joanne 12-10. Lu Arie and Katie Innes, the national U18 Doubles champions, had a bye.

The two semi-finals were as close as it gets: Alex and Charlotte beat Katie and Stuart 12-10; Lu and Katie won 12-11 against Rosa and Louise. Both games could have gone either way, as could the final, where Alex and Charlotte came through 12-11 after several match points alternated from one side to the other. The applause for "sir" and "miss" was deafening!

While all this was going on every player and most spectators had a go at the Ball-in-the-Box Challenge, which was won by Dan and Jasmine by a score of 28 points out of 50. They looked very pleased!

Prizes were awarded, words were spoken and the event came to an end by 4.30. Hopefully it achieved its aim: fun, enjoyment and improvement. I enjoyed it as much as ever.

Huge thanks go to Alex for bringing his group from Stamford; to parents who brought their offspring from far and wide; to young competitors who made their own way; to Elliot who ran the Challenge; and to the lovely Sarah who dispensed sticky labels and prizes. And to all the players, who made the day a success.

Updated National Rankings

November 2021

Now that tournament Fives is back up and running again, the RFA has today published the latest Open Singles and Doubles Rankings, along with the following update from the RFA's Rankings Tsar, Dave Hebden:

This update reflects the singles and doubles results from the London and West of England events held over the last month. The new Singles Rankings hold particular significance, because they will be used as the basis for determining the seeding in the forthcoming National Singles Championships.

In the Singles list there are not too many dramatic changes, so perhaps the main interest lies in the respective positions of the "Big Three" – Tristao, Kay, and Ellison. With Ed Kay winning three of the 5 events held this season I had thought that there was a good chance that he would take over the number one position. In the end, although the gap was closed, Dan Tristao held on to top spot by a narrow margin. It turned out that Dan's better record against Will over the last 3 years was sufficient to keep him at the top. I suppose that a top spot going into the National Singles for a player who has won that event on the last four occasions is not really too contentious. Will Ellison's win at the London sees him move a little closer to the top two, and we look forward to some great tussles in the Nationals.

Lower down, Cameron Low moves into the top 30 after a good performance in the West of England Plate. We also say goodbye from the Singles rankings, for now at least, to Hamish Buchanan, three-time National Champion in 1999, 2001 & 2007, a player who has graced the rankings over a very long period.

In the Doubles, Ellison, Kay and Arnold remain in the top three places, while Dan Tristao moves up to #4 and Charlie Brooks to #5.

It's encouraging to see a clutch of 10 new entries in the Doubles rankings. Ben Hale & Helena Tunks, Savanna Leboff & Ben Yass, and James Toop & Gwydion Wiseman were all quarter-finalists in the London Open, while Boris Ames & Will Bucknell reached the quarter-finals of the West of England Open. Will Edmonds & Emrys Thursfield also did well in the London Plate. We now have four female players in the Open Doubles rankings, a record I think.

Finally, I'm pleased to say that entry levels for the 2021-22 season have held up pretty well, despite the recovery from the Covid disruptions.

Draw for the National Singles Finals

December 4/5, Cambridge

Organiser Charlie Brooks has today published the draw for the National Singles 2021 — the Jesters Club Cup — to be played this coming weekend. Dan Tristao is seeded Number One, looking for his 5th consecutive title. Ed Kay (seeded 2), who has been runner-up to Dan on the last two occasions, will be looking for that elusive first title, while two-time champion and third seed Will Ellison will be looking to make it into the final for a ninth time.

Clubs from as far apart as the West of England Club in Bristol, the Edward Alleyn Club and the Old Paulines in London and the Caledonian Club in Edinburgh are well represented, while Lewis Keates from the Derby Moor Club and Old Bedfordian Chris Davey represent the Midlands.

There are several players from the Universities: Singles champion Andrew Boyd from Edinburgh; Archie McCreath, Cameron Low and Theo Parker (yes, really –still a student!) from Bristol; and the National Schools U18 Champion Gwydion Wiseman is making his debut — against the defending champion!

British Universities (BUSF) Championships

Schools Winchester Fives Doubles Championship

Jamie McManus reports: After the enforced hiatus of last year, the Schools' Winchester Fives Doubles tournament returned to its place as the 'season opening' tournament for schools. 15 pairs took part, representing Alleyn's, Christ's Hospital, Marlborough, Stamford, St. Paul's, Tonbridge and Winchester. The championship brought together some of the top talent in the U18 year group but also, with four U15 pairs involved, had an eye on the future.

Right from the start it was pleasing to see pairs from all schools making use of the buttress and doing their best to retrieve from it, too. In the main draw, things went very much according to the seeding as Alleyn's I and St. Paul's I made it through to one semi-final, while Alleyn's II and Winchester I came through the other half of the draw. With players thoroughly warmed up the hard hitting really got under way, with St. Paul's and Alleyn's slugging things out in traditional style but with the occasional buttress twist, while Winchester I, clearly on a mission, blew Alleyn's II away.

In the final, Winchester I got points up early against Alleyn's I, Cloke Browne playing particularly well from the left-hand side of the court, and he and his partner Wu took the first game comfortably. Alleyn's then fought back hard and at 11-10 in game 2, the match was up for grabs by either side. Fittingly, when Winchester pulled away for the win, they did so by getting the buttress back in play – it was the last thing struck as match point was won.

In the Plate competition two large groups meant plenty more fives for everybody. Marlborough overcame Tonbridge I in a tight game to win group A, and Winchester II made relatively serene progress through group B. A highlight of the group matches was the game between Stamford I and Winchester II, a repeat of the U14 Doubles final from the Nationals in August. This time Winchester won out 11-8 – utilising home court advantage, of course! Nevertheless there was a definite sense of many more excellent contests to come. In the Plate Final itself, Winchester II's experience and power proved too much for Marlborough as they won through 15-5.

As tournament organiser, I am most grateful to all the players and masters i/c for making the effort to come down to Winchester and provide an excellent and enjoyable day full of Fives. Despite the disruptions of the previous 18 months, it seemed to me that School Fives was simply picking up from where it had left off; the prospects for a competitive season ahead were obvious.

The National Singles Championships

Cambridge University Sports Centre Saturday/Sunday 4th-5th December 2021

STOP PRESS With his victory in the National Singles Championship Dan Tristao moves equal with James Toop with six titles, five of them in consecutive years, and equal with Neil Roberts in his number of open Singles titles — 33 in all, second only to Wayne Enstone on 94!

The David Gardner Longboat aka The Plate was won by Sam Russell.

Charlie Brooks reports: Dan Tristao won his fifth consecutive National Singles title and his sixth in total, equalling James Toop on both counts, to be the joint second most successful National Singles player after Wayne Enstone. A large crowd saw Dan beat Will Ellison in the final, in a familiar showdown between the most successful players of the last decade. It had all the hallmarks of previous clashes both at this tournament and others around the country... Enviable range of shots? Tick. Phenomenal retrieval? Of course. A close game? We'd be disappointed if it wasn't!

Will stormed into a 6-0 lead within the first few minutes, playing all-round Fives to keep Dan moving, and finding regular winners. As Dan settled and found his range, especially the touch and angles at the front of the court, he first turned the tide and then asserted dominance. Dan has honed these tactics to perfection and knows how to take advantage as a game wears on. Will was drawn into this pattern and was made to cover the full depth and width of the court seemingly numerous times each rally. Despite chasing everything down, Will could not dictate the points and Dan came away with the first game, 15-11.

The second game started in very much the same vein. Evenly matched, long rallies, but Dan with a telling edge. This brought the score to 13-7 and what everyone assumed would be the inevitable outcome. Not Will though! A superb fightback, where he upped his level to match and better Dan (with the help of mishit winner!) to draw level at 13-13. A rally for the ages followed, with enough drama for an entire match — control of the point ebbing and flowing, the two opponents covering inconceivable distances; it turned out to be a microcosm of the final. It was Dan who eventually triumphed, winning the next couple of points as well for a 15-11, 15-13 victory.

As you'd expect from the National Singles, there was some scintillating play throughout the draw, not just in the final, with a range of techniques on show; the energy of Watkinson and Kay, the power of Arnold and Beltrami or the accuracy of Aquilina and Tristao.

On Saturday, the day had culminated in an epic semi-final between Ed Kay, who has been in the past two finals, and Will. Using his intimate knowledge of his home courts, Ed pulled away at the end of the first game with a couple of unreturnable shots off both hands to win 15-9. The second game saw a score reversal as Will's experience came to the fore.

And so to the decider. As with the final, these two players are so closely matched; it was nip and tuck throughout: 10-10, 11-11, 12-12, 13-13! Another breathless rally ended with Ed on the floor after more retrieving, but showing great sportsmanship managed to scramble away to allow Will to play his shot to win the point and, not long after, the game. In the quarter-finals, Julian Aquilina certainly gave Ben Beltrami a run for his money, before Ben's shot making and experience at this level pulled him through to the semis. Julian has shown fantastic consistency this season, putting his opponents under pressure with his high-paced line-and-length game. This was enough to force a win in the first, but Ben's shot making fired him level, blasting many a winner in the second. Many more followed in game three, before Julian's superior fitness seemed to be putting him in the ascendency. But no; alas, he had left himself too much to do.

Undoubtedly this lengthy 3-gamer took its toll on Ben. He fought valiantly in the semi-final against Dan, but never looked to have the upper hand. 15-10 in the first showed that he has the ability to stay with, and challenge, Dan; the winners were at times incredible. By the end though, Dan was finding it easier to control rallies and took the second to 6. Elsewhere, there were reasonably comfortable first round victories for Andrew Boyd, Tom Watkinson and Charlie Brooks. They booked themselves quarter-finals against the top 3 seeds, with glimmers of hope of an upset — such is the level at the top though, these are few and far between.

In the plate, Sam Russell showed superb consistency in the group games and then the final against Cameron Low. As ever in this competition, the standard of matches was very hight indeed. In particular, the group game between Sam and Ollie Arnold was exactly the high-quality affair to be expected. The score ended 15-5, but that did not reflect the encounter, which was 5-5 after about half an hour. In the other group, Cameron had upset the seedings by beating Theo Parker; his languid style belies a steely determination that outlasted Theo's array of shots.

This year saw one of the biggest turnouts ever, with 57 players competing across 4 qualifying events (Edinburgh, Tiverton, Derby and London). Combined with the Challenger event on the same weekend, the numbers grew to 70. Here's to 100 participants in the near future!

3rd Challenger Tournament

STOP PRESS In the third Challenger Tournament, following the success of the first such event in December 2019, which Christian Blackaby won, and the second, in Durham, won by Andrew Boyd in July 2021, Anthony Goodwin from the Derby Moor Fives Club won the Tankard, beating Genesis Nsenga of the Edward Alleyn Club in the final.

Cambridge University was represented by Emrys Thursfield, Lennie Wells, Ben Yass and Holly Nugent, with former players Laurence Cook and Savanna Leboff; Derby Moor by Anthony Goodwin, Ashley Hill, Vishal Singh and Aaron Wheatley, the Edward Alleyn Club by Joe Garratt and Genesis Nsenga, plus newcomers to RFA events Oscar Naden and Max Langtry.

Charlie Brooks reports: Anthony Goodwin emerged victorious from the RFA Challenger Tournament, after a series of extremely close matches throughout the day. In the main draw, the semi-finals and final were very tight affairs, and the plate competitions continued this theme. Coming through to win the plates were Laurence Cook (1st Plate), Oscar Naden (2nd Plate) and Savanna Leboff (3rd Plate). Congratulations to all!

This was the third Challenger Tournament, after the 2019 debut (more had been planned before Covid lockdowns struck), and was held at the Cambridge courts alongside the National Singles. The event is open to everyone, except the 16 who qualified for the Nationals. This ensures new match-ups, allowing a wider variety of players, including newcomers and younger players, to compete in closely fought knockout games.

The tournament started with 4 groups of 4 players each, playing up to 11. Most of these followed the seedings, but there were some cracking contests that set the tone for the day: Wells vs Cook and Mathias vs Wheatley both ended 11-10. Once the groups were completed, players were split into the main draw (for the group winners) and 3 plate competitions — this is where the action really sparked into life.

Throughout the group stages, those players not on court were able to watch some of the National Singles finals. Did this added inspiration spur on the Challengers? It certainly seemed that way as match after match went down to the wire. Of the 12 knockout games, all but one was 15-10 or closer, and that one was after the two opponents had each edged their previous game 16-15!

With such an exhibition, it is tough to pick any out specifically, but the whole event was surely epitomised by Louise Mathias and Oscar Naden in one of the semi-finals. It went to 16-15 after more than an hour of hard-fought play.

In the main draw, Anthony just about got the better of Emrys Thursfield in the top half, while a hotly contested match between Genesis Nsenga and Ashley Hill went the way of the younger player, Genesis winning 16-14. That score was repeated in the final, but this time it was Anthony who came out on top. He used all his experience and guile to save a number of match points, with both players' hard-hitting producing numerous clear winners.

Thank you to all competitors; it was a brilliant showcase of Fives and demonstrated the value of this format. There were players who had never played in ranking tournaments before, and closely contested matches for all entrants — exactly the intent. The RFA is planning to hold two more Challenger Tournaments this season, so please keep an eye out as we head into 2022.

New Year RFA Rankings

After the National Singles December 2021 4 January 2022

Naturally, after a couple of months packed with important Fives tournaments, the new year brings new official RFA Open Singles and Doubles Rankings (which you can see on the <u>Rankings page on this website</u>), along with the following update from the RFA's Rankings Tsar, Dave Hebden:

The New Year rankings include the results from the seven ranking tournaments that took place in the second half of 2021, following the enforced break in the tournament calendar caused by covid, during which we lost 13 rankings events.

Since the last rankings update was published in October, we have had the University Championships, the National Singles Championship, and for the second time, a Challenger singles event for players outside the top 16, for which ranking points were once again on offer.

In the Singles Dan Tristao remains at the top following his win in the National Singles Championship. Although Will Ellison beat Ed Kay to reach the final, Ed retains second spot in the rankings, but the gap between the two is much reduced. These three remain well clear of fourth-placed Ben Beltrami, who was the fourth player in the semi-final line-up at the Nationals. Elsewhere in the top 10 there is little change, although Andrew Boyd moves up to ninth after winning the University event and reaching the quarter-finals in the National Singles. His opponent in the University final, Ben Jourdan, moves up to #16, while Cameron Low enters the top 20 at #18. Both these players also qualified for the last 16 of the National Singles, although Ben had to drop out due to injury.

Anthony Goodwin benefited from winning the Challenger event and moves up to #21. Other Singles qualifiers Archie McCreath and Gwydion Wiseman make progress in the top 30, while Uni semi-finalist Douglas Law moves up to #31.

We then see an encouraging crop of 13 young new entries, six from the University event (Doug Tidy, Lennie Wells, Ben Yass, Oliver Heath, Andrew Shaw, Louis Odgers), three from the National Singles Qualifiers (Wyman Chan, Stuart Scott, Aiden Whitham), and four from the Challenger event (Ashley Hill, Genesis Nsenga, Laurence Cook, Emrys Thursfield). Is it possible that there are some future champions amongst this group?

The Doubles update includes results from the University Championships. Given that this is not an open event, the points awarded for this competition are reduced, so we do not see a huge change in the overall rankings. However, champions Andrew Boyd and Ben Jourdan improve their positions, while Cameron Low and Douglas Law both enter the top 20.

Lower down, Julius Davies, Emrys Thursfield and Harry Jackson all make progress, while we have 11 new entries (Doug Tidy, Isaac Weaver, Callum Clark, Murray Dare, Oliver Heath, Adam Hutchinson, Teddy Monro-Davies, Louis Odgers, Andrew Shaw, Lennie Wells, and Holly Nugent). Holly joins three other female players now in the Open Doubles Rankings.

Congratulations to Theo Parker for maintaining a good entry in the University Championships despite the current difficulties, and to Charlie Brooks, who managed an entry of 57 players for the National Singles, very close to the all-time record of 59.

West of England Schools Championships

Sherborne School, Dorset Saturday/Sunday, 8-9 January 2022

STOP PRESS Three titles for Alleyn's School and one for Winchester College, the two dominant squads at this year's Championships.

Sam Roberts reports: After an uncertain few weeks over Christmas and the New Year, waiting to see whether new covid restrictions would be announced which would prevent the tournament taking place, or whether so many players and supervising staff would be forced to isolate that no meaningful competition was possible, it was a wonderful thing to stage the Schools West of England Fives Championships, and to feel that perhaps fives was back to normal, two years since the last event. We are extremely grateful to Sherborne School for hosting the tournament.

In the end, covid, other school sports fixtures and revision for GCSE assessments took their toll on the entries. Blundell's were forced to withdraw all their players because a key member of staff was isolating, and the U16s were reduced to 15 players in the Singles.

Despite all these issues, it was a weekend of excellent fives, played in front of enthusiastic (masked ...) supporters.

In the U16 Singles, things went according to seeding – apart from a fantastic run by Fintan Delaney of St Paul's, who swept aside fourth seed Laurie Milner of Alleyn's in the quarter-final and nearly took out the top seed, Anthony Cloke Browne of Winchester, in the semi-final, with Anthony scraping through 11-9 in the third game. In the final, Theo Vernacchio of Alleyn's kept his composure to win a mammoth tussle in the first game and then achieved victory in a shorter second game, against an understandably tired Cloke Browne.

In the U16 Doubles, the draw was strengthened by two pairs from Stamford who made a seven hour round trip on the Sunday in order to play. Despite their long journey, Stamford first pair of Chase Burgess & Cam Drutman cruised past Tonbridge to reach the semi-final – both being U15 pairs who should return stronger next year. In the semi-final, Winchester 1 (Cloke Browne & Jeffrey Chan) were a little too consistent and hard hitting for Stamford, and in the other half of the draw, Alleyn's (Milner & Vernacchio) defeated the Sherborne pair of Alex Upton & Charlie Money with some well organised and effective play. The final was hard fought and intense – Winchester unsettling Alleyn's to take the first game easily, before Alleyn's regained their composure, cut down on the errors and won the match in three games.

In the Open Singles, the semi-finals involved two match-ups between Alleyn's & Winchester – Gwydion Wiseman against Marcus Cloke Browne, and Stuart Scott against Shiloh Wu – but only after Cloke Browne had come through a fantastic three-gamer against Aiden Whitham of St Paul's, and Scott had weathered a brilliant passage of play from Genesis Nsenga of St Olave's, who took the match to three games. In the semi-finals, Wu's superior accuracy and low hitting was too much for Scott, and Wiseman's speed and variation eventually prevailed against Cloke Browne, who nevertheless made the top seed work hard for his win. The final produced a memorable display of high quality, relentless fives. In the first game, Wu and Wiseman were evenly matched, each taking it in turns to hit the perfect length or a clean nick. Wiseman closed out the game, partly thanks to some unreturnable serves, and then held his nerve in the second, showing great self-discipline and focus to slowly drag Wu out of position in the long, draining rallies, before playing his winners. Despite it only going to two games, it was one of the highest quality, most evenly matched finals for years.

In the Open Doubles, the early rounds were fairly one sided – apart from Tonbridge 1 (Neil Hudson & Max Freudenheim) rallying to nearly take St Paul's 2 (Alex Ridley & Benny Harrison) to a third game decider, and St Paul's 1 (Aiden Whitham & Ben Roberts) being forced to claw their way back from 10-3 down to win the second game and close out the match against the scratch 'Edward Alleyn Club' pairing of Genesis Nsenga & Jake Johnston. The semi-finals were

wonderfully intense affairs, with long rallies and superb retrieving, as the two St Paul's pairs each came close to taking their matches to a third game. In the final, Winchester (Cloke Browne & Wu) played consistent, powerful fives in the first game, establishing an early lead and only conceding two points to Alleyn's (Wiseman & Scott). A similar fast start in the second game took them into a commanding 6-1 lead. With their backs to the wall, the Alleyn's pair found new aggression and commitment and they stormed through to take the game. In the third game, Alleyn's gained an early lead but Winchester were still playing excellent fives and they gradually pulled level, and then moved clear to take the deciding game 11-7. It was a classic final, and a fitting way to end the tournament.

Gown encounter.

With the new year having brought a welcome run of RFA events – including the Under 25, North West, and North of England Championships – we are delighted to bring you the new official RFA Open Singles and Doubles Rankings), along with the following update from the RFA's Rankings Tsar, Dave Hebden:

"The top three in the Singles Rankings remain the same as before, but things could not be very much closer. Dan Tristao maintains his position at the top thanks to his National Singles wins over the last two years, as well as having a very marginally superior head-to-head record against the other two. Ed Kay, after his win in the North of England Championships, now holds four open singles titles this season, and retains second place, while North West champion Will Ellison follows closely in third position.

Ben Beltrami, who makes a habit of never beating those above him in the rankings, but never losing to those below him, is solidly in fourth place. If more players did this, my task of compiling the rankings would be very much easier! Following good results in the Under 25 and North of England Championships, Tom Watkinson nudges ahead of Julian Aquilina into #6, and North of England semi-finalist Richie Murby enters the Top 10 at #9.

Highest new entry, at #22, is Marco Skogh, who had some very good victories en route to winning the North West Plate Singles. It is encouraging to see a total of eight new entries in this update. The National Winchester Fives Doubles Championship

Sedbergh School, Cumbria Sunday, 13th March 2022

STOP PRESS 11 pairs contested the National Winchester Fives Doubles Championship, organised by Harry Akerman. From the group stages a main draw and a Plate draw emerged. In the main draw former winner Dave Butler and his first-time partner Lewis Keates fought their way to the final, after a tough semi-final against Harry Akerman & Andrew Passey. In the final, however, they found defending champions Will Ellison & Ed Kay too much to handle. Will has now won this title eleven times, 6 times with Hal Mohammed, Ed on five occasions, all with Will. In the Plate the ex-Oxford pairing of Matt Hale & Nick Whitney took away the spoils — which means the Hale brothers now have the unique distinction of having won between them the Grand Slam of Barnes Bridge Plates: Ben at Winchester, Bradfield and Malvern, and Matt now at Sedbergh.

Organiser Harry Akerman reports: Despite a smaller than usual draw for the Barnes Bridge this year, 11 pairs had a great day of fives thanks to the generosity of Sedbergh School, who kindly hosted and fed us on a pleasant Spring day up in The Lakes. 2 round robin groups settled the seedings for the main draw, which was played in a usual knockout format. Most of the quarter-final matches went as expected, although the hard hitting Oscar Mcintyre complemented by his very steady partner Adam Hicks came close to knocking out Andy Passey & Harry Akerman by taking the first game 11-7 and finding themselves up in the second. The semi-final saw Ben Hale & Mike Suddaby get more points off Will Ellison & Ed Kay than anyone else did in the day. In the next door court Andy & Harry surprised themselves winning the first seven rallies of their match against Dave Butler & Lewis Keates, thus finding themselves 7-0 up. Normal service was resumed as Dave & Lewis went on to win the first game 11-7. The second game was a tighter affair, with Andy & Harry taking it 11-9 but in doing so they ran out of steam, so Dave & Lewis went through as deserved winners. The final was a classy watch, but there was only ever going to be one winner. For a while at the start of the second game Dave & Lewis stayed with Ed & Will, but the consistency, power, touch and speed around the court proved too much and so Will won his 11th and Ed his 5th Barnes Bridge.

The Plate final saw Oscar & Adam take on Matt Hale & Nick Whitney, with the latter pair looking to avenge their 11-7 loss of the morning's round robin match. Some steady play saw Matt & Nick get their revenge coming out 15-4, 15-11 victors, so Matt gets his name on a Plate that now displays a 'Hale' as a winner for three of the last four years.

Thanks very much for those who came from afar to help make this such an enjoyable day, with a special thanks to those who are also making the trek up to the Jesters Tour in Edinburgh for back-to-back fives weekends. Thanks also to Rupert Follett and the boys from Sedbergh for joining in and getting stuck into the fives. There was plenty of potential, enthusiasm and good sportsmanship on show.

hard-fought National U13 Championships

National U13 Championships

St Paul's School, Barnes Sunday, 13th March 2022

STOP PRESS 38 players contested this year's U13 Championships. Competitors from Berkhamsted School, newcomers who play Eton Fives, dominated both the Singles and Doubles with their hard hitting and impressive footwork, but were pushed hard in both categories by players from Alleyn's, Stamford and the Manchester Y Club, also represented in this event for the first time. Warm thanks go to organiser Sam Russell and to the Blundell's contingent who made the long journey from Tiverton.

Organiser Sam Russell reports: "The game of fives is alive and well" a voice, belonging to a former pupil at St Olave's and current grandfather to a competitor in this year's U13 Championships, rang out from the balcony of the St Paul's School courts. It would be hard to disagree – the quality of this year's tournament was up there with the best it has ever been.

In the singles, it quickly became clear that Berkhamsted, who were playing the sport for the first time as Eton Fives specialists, were going to be the school to beat, with 5 out of 6 of their entrants qualifying for the knockout stages. Stamford, however, were certainly not going to roll over, having consistently improved since Alex Smith introduced fives at the school – and were also genuine contenders for the title, with Jones and Hunter winning their groups comfortably.

The key battle in the round of 16 was between Burrows (Stamford), who was a favourite for the tournament having reached the quarter-finals as an U12 the previous year, and Keane, a member of the high class Berkhamsted contingent. The game was won by Keane 11-4, consolidating Berkhamsted's credentials as the school to beat.

Meanwhile, however, Val Fikhter (of the Y-Club) was making easy work of his half of the draw, beating Geldeard (Alleyn's) and Taylor-Ross (Blundell's) on route to the semi-finals, dropping only 6 points in the process. Having practised with adults at the Y Club, and also being a junior wrestling champion, he was playing with a consistency and physicality seldom seen at U13 level.

The semi-finals saw Fikhter take on Hunter (Stamford) and Josh Fienberg take on Keane (the two of them from Berkhamsted). Both games were of very high quality with long rallies and remarkable accuracy; however, Fikhter and Fienberg both ended up convincing winners.

The final was simply the best game of U13s fives in recent history. Fikhter game out of the blocks firing, clearly familiar with intense competition, and established an early lead. Fienberg soon found his rhythm, starting to manipulate the ball down the left-hand side skillfully, in order to set up his big right hand winners. While Fikhter retrieved with effective consistency, he could not get on top in the rallies and Fienberg managed to turn the early deficit into a 14-3 lead. The prospect of losing galvanized Fikhter, who dug in admirably, saving a number of match points and slowly eat away at the score line. While a comeback looked on the cards, it was ultimately not meant to be, and Fienberg completed a deserved victory 15-8.

In the doubles, Fienberg then paired up with Faulkner to convincingly take down Alleyn's in the final. It had been an incredibly impressive showing by the Alleyn's pair of Zheng & Dorokhov, who made it to the final despite only being the 2rd pair at their school by beating Stamford 1 11-9 in the semi-finals, which was the game of the tournament. Stamford are no doubt now within touching distance of getting their hands on the top prize, having been the most consistent school at U13 level for the past 3 years.

Stamford did, however, win the Plate competition, beating the Y Club in the final. Commendation goes to Negyal & James-Duff, who successfully paired up despite being a couple of years younger than the rest of the field. Equally Grindal, Stevens, Tyler and Wright all performed incredibly well and will no doubt be the pairs to beat at the Girls' Nationals.

Many thanks to all who entered, particularly the coaches for all they do to promote fives at their school. See you next year.

Scottish Schools Championships

Fettes College, Edinburgh, March 2022

With many thanks to Richie Murby for the following information on the 2022 Scottish Schools Championships, which were played on 3 separate days in March.

U18 Singles: Fettes College was the venue for the Scottish Schools' Singles U18 Championships, in which 14 players from Edinburgh Academy, Fettes College, Merchiston Castle School and Loretto School took part. Encouragingly, each school advanced at least as far as the quarter-finals, and there were many thrilling and close matches throughout what was an extremely enjoyable day of Fives.

Edinburgh Academy's young squad did well to produce four of the eventual quarter-finalists, but Wyman Chan of Fettes won the Boyd Trophy in the main competition in a scintillating final, while Merchiston provided the runner-up in the main competition, Lachlan Ferguson and took home the McKeown Plate.

U18 Doubles: Wyman Chan of Fettes College added to his Boyd Trophy win by taking the U18 doubles championship with his in-form doubles partner Toby Chan. Among many good performances from the four schools represented, Edinburgh Academy's young 1st pair of Calum Swanson and Ronnie Brown did very well to oust the 2nd seeds, Merchiston I, in the semi-finals. However, they had no answer to the composed combining and great finishing of the Fettes duo. Meanwhile, the Plate saw two very entertaining and close semi-finals, with Sam Park and Isaac Ferguson of Merchiston deservedly emerging as winners. Wyman and Toby went on to win the Plate at the National U18 Doubles in London.

U16 Doubles: This competition was won by the pair from Merchiston Castle, Sam Park and William Gale. There was no Singles competition held but Sam went on to win the National U16 Singles competition in London.

All four Edinburgh Schools entered players in the National Schools Championships in London and made their mark in each of the three categories, particularly in the U16s, where Calum Swanson & Hugo Rintoul from Edinburgh Academy won the Marchant Cup, a first for the Academy, the Singles title having gone to Merchiston.

There was no Scottish tournament for the Girls this year but we look forward to seeing some of the players from the Edinburgh Academy at the National Schoolgirls' Championships at Oundle School on Sunday April 24th.

Geoff Sherratt 1941-2022

The RFA is sad to report the death, at the age of 80, of ex-President Geoff Sherratt, after a long illness.

David Barnes and Dave Hebden provide the following account of Geoff's long and outstanding participation in the sport of Fives. [David Hebden subsequently amplified this with reminiscences from Peter Woods and himself.]

Geoff Sherratt and Fives

Geoff started to play fives at the YMCA with Peter Woods in the early 1970s. They were encouraged and coached by Fred Beswick, and became regulars at Club nights and on tour. Geoff eventually became Club Captain for several years.

'Manchester Championships' (3 different names)

1977 Geoff organised the Lancashire Open Championships, taking over from Fred Beswick.

1978-79-80-81-82-83-84-85-86 Geoff organised the (renamed) Greater Manchester County Open Championships.

Then he organised the (again renamed) North West Open Championships 1987-88-89-90.

So Geoff organised the same regional event, with three different names, for 14 years. John Beswick took over as organiser of the North West Open in 1991.

Wood Cup (National Club Championship)

The YMCA have the proudest record in the Wood Cup competition: 16 wins out of 26 appearances in the final. We don't know exactly how often Geoff played for the Club squad in the Wood Cup, but it must have been a large number of times. The following skimpy details are from the RFA Handbook, which was not always good at recording names of players.

In 1978 Geoff played a key role supporting the YMCA squad which succeeded in winning their first Wood Cup Trophy, with Enstone, Wynn, Murray and Woods playing in the final.

The following year Geoff was in the YMCA side to win the Wood Cup final (Enstone, Wynn, Sherratt and Murray). The semi-finals and final were played on the Merchant Taylors' School courts, and the other finalists were the Old Merchant Taylors'.

The YMCA went on to win the Wood Cup in 1983, 1984, 1985, and 1986. In each of these years the winning final side was Enstone, Ashton, Davies and Hyde, but Geoff contributed in each of these campaigns in the earlier rounds.

In 1987 Geoff was back in the YMCA final winning team alongside Enstone, Ashton and Curry.

Open Championships

Although a late starter in the game of Fives, Geoff became a very good player. In addition to his contribution to YM Fives, Geoff was often to be seen on the open tournament circuit. He was always competitive and had some notable successes, including winning the South West Doubles with Dave Hebden in 1986 and having a good run in the National Doubles with Wayne Enstone in the late 1980s.

Veterans Championships

Geoff first qualified by age to enter the Veterans Championships in April 1987. He reached the final by beating Roger Freebairn in the semis, but lost in the final to Tony Hughes, his doubles partner.

Geoff's glory years in the Veterans event were 1988, 1989 and 1990 when he won the Doubles with John Howe. He and John were also runners-up in 1991.

The Rugby Fives Association

Geoff was very proud to be elected President of the RFA in 2003. He played an important part in the administration and development of the RFA during the period 2001-2003 (as Deputy President) and 2003-05 (as President). He was an enthusiastic supporter of RFA events, presenting the trophies whenever possible, and he travelled without fail from Manchester to London for RFA Committee and Board meetings.

Jesters Tour to Edinburgh

Edinburgh, 18-20 March 2022

Ben Hale reports: Having had to cancel the January 2021 and January 2022 Jesters tours to Edinburgh we were delighted (relieved) to finally get up to Edinburgh the weekend of 18-20 March.

We didn't quite make it to The Cumberland for our traditional Friday pub lunch to start the tour but were on the Edinburgh Academy courts at half one for the usual conveyor belt of young fives players representing their Junior and U16 boys and girls. We played through to 5pm with many victories for Fives. A team of four, including senior tourist Andy Passey resplendent in his new tracksuit, also headed out to Merchiston Castle for the traditional Friday afternoon banana skin fixture against their U16s — though this year experience did not win out.

The Friday Fives finishes with the select tournaments. Fettes saw six school boys each teaming up with a Jester to play a pairs tournament. Hard luck to the two lads that drew the organisers — we didn't do so well. The three pairs featuring Max (EA), Will (EA) and Nathan (Loretto) all did well, finishing with scores in the mid-forties. However, Sam from Merchiston partnering tour debutant Lewis Keates scored 52 out of 55, thereby once again winning the Akerman Quaich for Merchiston. Well played, Sam (and Lewis). Over at the Academy eight of their senior girls paired up with four Jesters (Hector McFarlane's maths, not mine) to play out an almost three-hour round robin which was eventually decided on a points per game basis, with Olivia of EA and Jester Shinan Zhang winning ahead of Louise and Jen from EA, who'd both been playing with Jez Sinton.

After the tournaments we headed to Fettes for the ever welcome and never under-catered curry reception. The touring Jesters are joined by many of our weekend opponents, parents and teachers for a meal that never disappoints and definitely never runs out! Our thanks as ever to the staff at Fettes for being so welcoming. Hasty arrangements were then made to visit old favourites on Rose Street before the following day's Fives.

Saturday morning saw all the fit and able tourists take to the court, along with many who possibly weren't. This year's matches featured a North vs. South (well played to the North, although does Ben Jourdan of Edinburgh count as north of

the UK or south of Scotland?); the Wessex Club against Southampton University (somewhat of a Tuesday evening at Winchester in the 2010s vibe which someone won by two points, but given Andy Passey was the only person not eligible for either team it was hard to keep track); and this year's edition of the Sinton-Matthews Cup! As there were a number of absent friends from the usual Bradfield and Christ's Hospital contingent this year's fixture took on something of an invitational character with the match somewhat predictably ending in a tie Lunch was taken at Clark's Bar — many thanks to Jez Sinton for arranging and supervising!

The afternoon saw a return to the school fixtures, starting with a match against the Edinburgh Academy U16s, who scored moral victories in their singles — particularly against Butler and Suddaby — and very nearly nicked a doubles against Suddaby and this Hale. The U16 girls followed where there were no victories, moral or otherwise, for Alex Smith's serve! The girls couldn't quite manage the scalps of Zhang and Thornhill either. We also sent teams out to Merchiston and Fettes to join the touring Tonbridge school team for some tough matches involving several promising young Fives players and some Jesters.

In a new addition we also sent four Jesters up to Strathallan for some squash court Fives. I've heard only good things about the scenery on the drive, the food provided and the Fives played. A repeat fixture next year seems a must! The plan to round off the day of Fives had been to stage our usual clash with the Accies, along with the inaugural Frank Akerman Survivor Series for anyone left standing — unfortunately nobody was! #bringbackFrank Suffering as we were by this point we were no match either for the Accies team of Boyd, Murby, Jourdan x2 and McFarlane and once again surrendered the teapot — but given that it resides in Hector's attic we never really had it anyway.

We had dinner as always at La P'tite Folie — fortunately nobody mentioned the rugby — it was a delight to not only be joined by some local Fives luminaries but also by the touring Tonbridge team. Thoughts were shared by Matthews and Smith with a riposte from McFarlane before we disappeared into the night with rumours of further victores — not sure I can call them moral or for the game of Fives ...

We rounded off the Fives on Sunday morning with games against the senior teams from each of Fettes, the Academy and Loretto, plus a game against the Caledonian Club at Merchiston. Lacking Boyd, Jourdan and Murby as they were, we were actually able to beat the Cali Club. Things were tight down at Fettes though, with their first pair seeing off Hale Snr and Wakelam but not quite managing to repeat the feat against Chai and Zhang. I caught the end of the game at the Academy which followed their match with Tonbridge — a lot of tired bodies! The reports from Loretto indicate that Andy Passey continued to spite his birth certificate, finishing the tour as he'd started it.

That just leaves me to thank the schools and masters in charge for hosting and welcoming us; our drivers for actually making the tour happen; and Dave, who does all the work!

And P.S. — congratulations to Calum and Hugo from EA on their National U16 Doubles title!

National Schools Championships

St Paul's School, Barnes Saturday/Monday, 26-28 March 2022

Bob Dolby reports: After the hiatus caused by the pandemic the National Schools Championships returned to St Paul's School this year, in a stream-lined format, run by Dave Butler, aided principally by Ian Jackson, Hector McFarlane and Alex Smith. More than 200 people attended over the three days, either as spectators or players, and huge thanks must go to all of them and to the players' coaches for their enthusiastic support of the event. It was good to see the Deputy President of the RFA, Julie McIntyre, supporting her City of Durham Club, and the new Secretary General of the RFA, Chris Blakeley, familiarising himself with this annual feast of Fives.

The standard and intensity of play in all three age-groups was remarkable, and was highest in the U18 category. Such was the quality of the top 20 or so of the players of that age, among them several regional champions, that upsets were expected, and they duly occurred in both the Singles and the Doubles. The 8 players representing Alleyn's, Durham, Tonbridge and Winchester who reached the quarter-finals of the Singles had ousted highly fancied players from St Olave's, St Paul's, Fettes and Merchiston, and it was by no means certain that the two top seeds, Gwydion Wiseman and Shiloh Wu, would progress to the final. Once they did so the topic of discussion in the gallery was: Can Gwydion make it three titles in a row and equal Peter Mellor's unique record from the 1960s? Peter was himself present to see if it would

happen. It didn't. Shiloh played extraordinarily well, Gwydion rather below his best. The Jesters Cup went to Winchester, giving Shiloh a chance to return next year to defend it.

In the U18 Doubles there was also the question: Could Wu & Cloke Browne make it a clean sweep of all three Schools Doubles Championships, a feat rarely accomplished, or could the Alleyn's pair of Wiseman & Scott make it three in a row, never done? Both pairs first had to beat pairs from St Olave's and City of Durham in semi-final matches which were as fine as any seen at that stage of the competition. Once more the two top seeded pairs did get through and, yes, the Winchester pair did pull off the treble of Winchester Fives Doubles in November, West of England Schools Doubles in January and National Schools Doubles in March.

The U16 age-group was enlivened by the presence of very good players from Edinburgh Academy and Merchiston Castle challenging the traditional strength of Alleyn's, St Paul's, Winchester and the emerging players of Stamford School. There was very little to choose between the eight players who made the quarter-finals, with some of the encounters going to three games. There was no doubt that the top seed from Alleyn's was increasingly hampered by injury, but it was no great upset to see the fine top player from Scotland, Merchiston's Sam Park, win a three-game final. It was a wonderful surprise though for the Edinburgh Academy pair of Hugo Rintoul & Calum Swanson to win the magnificent Marchant Cup for U16 Doubles, the first time the school has done so. In that final, another three-gamer, it was again Alleyn's who took the silver.

The U14 competition was run over two days. Seeding was worked out by the organiser in conjunction with the various coaches and proved to be very accurate once the group stages were completed. Year in, year out those watching are amazed by the promise shown and the level already achieved by this inexperienced group. Young players from Alleyn's, Merchiston, St Paul's, Tonbridge, Winchester and increasingly Stamford caught the eye in both Singles and Doubles. In the end it was double gold for Winchester and double silver for Merchiston.

Dave Butler deserves great credit for managing to run, so calmly, an event with nearly 150 players from 17 schools in just three days, but so too do the players — once they get going they run much of the show themselves. Branded shirts are a huge help to everyone in finding their opponents!

Equally warm thanks must go to St Paul's School, to its master i/c Sam Roberts, and to the very accommodating Sports Centre staff for hosting the championships so generously.

The Wood Cup

St Paul's School and Alleyn's School Saturday/Sunday, 23-24 April 2022

Organiser Tom Watkinson reports: After a number of years of reduced entry to the Wood Cup (the National Club Knock-Out) I am delighted to report that this year's entry is the largest I have been able to find a record of. A total of 12 teams descended upon the twin venues of Alleyn's and St Paul's to contest the two-day event, played in the traditional format of both singles and doubles

Before laying out the story of the weekend the organiser would like to extend his sincere thanks to all 12 teams who took part and put up with the sort of glitches that occur only when an event is run by a first-time organiser. Particularly I would like to thank the team captains who were able to field two IVs, who in no particular order were: Ollie Arnold (West of England), Lewis Keates (Derby Moor) and Michael Suddaby (Old Rugby). So, on to the story of the two days ...

Day 1 - Group Stage

Day 1 consisted of the group stages, with the twelve teams split into 3 groups of 4 teams. Group winners and the team with the second most points were to progress to the semi-finals, with the next-best-placed four teams to progress to the Plate semi-finals.

Group 1

Group 1 included the number 1 seeds and defending champions, the West of England 1st IV – comprising Ollie Arnold (c), Theo Parker, Tom Watkinson and Tom Maconie. With such depth, WoE1 were always likely to be a tough team to take on in the group stages and so it proved, with them winning every set they played, running out with a maximum total of 396 points. That said, with the format allowing the second-best placed team to qualify for the semi-finals there was still left much for the other three teams to play for. The pick of the Group 1 games was Derby Moor 2 vs. Old Rugby 1, which the latter managed to win by the narrowest of margins. Michael Suddaby deserves tremendous credit for fielding two Old Rugby teams, given he is the only regular tournament player from the Old Rugbeians, and it must be said that

Old Rugby 1 played brilliantly despite their lack of match practice. Thus, when all was said and done, West of England 1 went through as group winners (396 points), with the Executioners as group runners-up on 295 points.

Group 2

Group 2 was described by many as the group of death, with three very strong sides in WoE2, Derby Moor 1 and the second seeds, the Old Paulines. The main topic of discussion going into the event was what team the Old Paulines would field at each stage. Constrained by availability (and potentially by the fact a host of their players were playing for different teams), up until Saturday morning it was unclear to all but reigning National Doubles champion and team captain Charlie Brooks who would be taking part. Rumours abounded that Ben Beltrami was flying in from Dubai specially for the weekend, or that Ed Kay had taken his gloves with him on holiday and so would be able to fly into Heathrow and come straight to the courts for the Sunday morning. However, neither proved to be the case and in the end Charlie Brooks lined up alongside three current St Paul's pupils for their first match against Old Rugby 2. All the uncertainty didn't seem to do the Paulines much harm though, and they duly won their first match with relative comfort. As the tournament progressed Charlie would bolster his line-up with journey-man tournament player Sam Russell (currently ranked 11 in the country) and – on Sunday – with reigning National Singles champion and number 1 ranked player in the country, Dan Tristao. As a result Old Paulines lived up to their seeding, winning all their games and progressing to the semi-finals on the Sunday. That just left WoE2 and DM1 to fight it out for second place. In what was one of the closest games of the weekend WoE2 edged it 100 points to 91 and hence cantered in second place in the group. Final standings in the group were 1st Old Paulines, 2nd WoE 2 (295 points), DM1 (224 points) and 4th Old Rugby 2.

Group 3

Due to the size of the entry, group 3 played all their matches at Alleyn's in order for the event to take two days only. Unfortunately as organiser I was at St Paul's for the whole of the Saturday and so missed out on all the matches played there, although I have been assured that there were some fantastic games, not least the grudge match between Old Cambridge and Old Oxford, won this year by Old Oxford. With all the scores totted up the 3rd seeds, the Jesters Club, won all their games and so progressed to the semi-finals. The Edward Alleyn Club (which seemed to consist almost entirely of players under the age of 18), caused the upset of the day by beating the experienced teams from Cambridge and Oxford and hence came in second. However, such was their surprise at this result that they hadn't made contingency plans to be able to play on the Sunday and hence they were unable to feature in either the Plate or the main competition.

Thus, overall the three group winners, along with the Executioners, progressed to the semis, whilst WoE2, DM1, Old Rugby 1 and Old Oxford progressed to the Plate semis.

Day 2 – Finals Day

I am conscious that this write-up is stretching somewhat and so I shall restrict myself to making only brief allusion to events on Sunday. In the first semi-final WoE1 were in ruthless form in beating the very strong Executioners IV, whilst in the second semi the crowds were treated to the match of the tournament: Old Paulines versus Jesters, led by prominent Old Pauline Julian Aquilina. The deciding factor in the contest was perhaps the fact that the Old Paulines were able to call on a fresh Dan Tristao for the Sunday, with the Jesters team quietly admitting that they had "played a lot of fives". Particular mention should go to singles game between Dan and Julian, which was truly epic and had most of the players crowded around the gallery (as opposed to playing ... much to the annoyance of the organiser). Thus, the final was to be WoE1 vs Old Paulines. Much can be said about the final, and doubtless has already been said in much detail at various pubs around the country, and so the organiser (who cannot claim but be somewhat biased) will leave it at this – WoE1 managed to hold strong against the Old Paulines to run out eventual winners and retain their trophy.

The Plate was just as hotly contested: a repeat of one of the group fixtures in the final – DM1 vs. WoE2. The WoE team again proved victorious and thus the West of England Club took home both the Plate and the Cup, cementing its place as the dominant club in the country for 2022.

I would again like to express my gratitude to those who both played and attended over the weekend (including one or two perhaps disgruntled girlfriends/partners). I am looking forward to next year's instalment already and hope to welcome back some of the clubs who were unable to take part this year (to name but a few: Wessex, Manchester Y Club, Exeter, Caledonian Club, City of Durham and more). The aim for next year is very much an entry of at least 16 teams.

The RFA Dinner 2022

Queen's Club, London Saturday 23rd April 2022

48 players and friends came together on Saturday 23rd April at Queen's Club for the first RFA Dinner since 2018. As is the tradition the event was held the same weekend as the Wood Cup, the Club Knock-out competition which has run since 1974. There is a separate report on the **Wood Cup 2022** on the RFA website.

Of the 48 attending, 26 were players in the Wood Cup and 8 were RFA Board Members. The Association welcomed 3 guests who have made important contributions to the Association as donors or facilators, as well as being pleased to see a number of our senior members, and our current National Doubles champions.

Just the one speech was made, by the outgoing President, David Parlby. In his speech David outlined the idea that has driven his period in office: namely the belief, common to all those present, that Fives is a brilliant game which we would all like to see thrive.

"In many ways fives is in a good place, with a big increase in the number of women playing, well attended competitions, a strong club scene and an innovative and committed Board. There are areas of concern: existing courts need, and will continue to need, expensive refurbishment, too many players stop playing after leaving school, and not enough new players take up the game. We have a strategy to deal with these issues and we are making progress. However, to achieve our aims the RFA needs more members and more money."

David confessed that the Association has not been great at telling members and non-members about what it does. Hence the attempt to address this weakness by producing a short video to be hosted on the RFA website and displayed at RFA events, giving an overview of the RFA's activities. Dinner guests were treated to the premiere showing of the video: it shows the restart of fives at Stoke Newington School, where the RFA has spent £10,000 in getting the six courts back into play, funding a coaching programme and provision of gloves and balls; it shows fives being played at Mount Kelly after the RFA's intervention to get a court back in play; it shows squash fives in action, and fives being played at Loretto, where the roof, walls and floors of the 3 courts have been refurbished to a high standard.

David's message to all those present: tell everyone you know about fives and encourage them to try the game out. The more you help the RFA, the more we can help you to continue playing fives for a long time to come.

He concluded by announcing the results of the Silent Auction, which realised £2,450 for the RFA.

End of Season rankings

22nd May 2022

Rankings Czar Dave Hebden writes: At last we have a full season of fives to report on, the last being the 2018-19 season. There is plenty of interest to discuss in the Singles and Doubles list, but let me lead with a couple of encouraging observations.

Firstly, there will have been worries about the support for the various events following two severely disrupted years. Yet it turns out that last season there was a record total entry across the 12 rankings Singles events. This was partly due to the inclusion of the Challenger event, held for the second time after being introduced in 2019, but the level of support across all events was impressive. The Doubles also had a solid year, maintaining the levels of entry we have seen in recent years. Congratulations to all our tournament organisers for achieving these levels of entry.

Secondly, we see a healthy number of new names featuring in this season's rankings lists. The Singles and Doubles lists have never been longer. And among the Open Doubles names we find six female players – another record – with Louise Mathias leading the way at #44.

Please note that, for these end-of-season Rankings, the values in the 'Previous' column are set to the positions at start of season, so that changes over the whole year are reflected.

In the Singles rankings, Dan Tristao, Ed Kay, and Will Ellison continue to dominate at the top. None of these players has lost a match to anyone except each other since 2018. In addition to winning the National Singles, Dan also won in Scotland, while Ed had a great season, picking up four trophies. The rest of the spoils went to Will (with two titles), Dave Butler (who won in the South East), and Anthony Goodwin, who won the Challenger event. Who will be the first to break into this top three stronghold? Perhaps U25 champion Ben Beltrami, or University champion Andrew Boyd? Maybe, but there still seems to be quite a gap to bridge.

Elsewhere in the Top 10, Tom Watkinson moves up to #6, and Sam Russell, Ben Jourdan, and Cameron Low make good progress in the Top 20. Joe Sumner moves up to #21, but the highest new entry is Marco Skogh at #22 following his win in the North West Plate. In total there are 24 new entries in the Singles rankings.

In the Doubles, Will Ellison returns to the top after an impressive season, winning five of the seven Open titles on offer with a variety of partners, including the National Doubles and the South West with Charlie Brooks. The other Open titles were shared between Ed Kay (two), Dan Tristao (two), Ollie Arnold (two), and Ben Beltrami (one). Ollie also picked up the U25 title with Ben Beltrami, while the University event was won by Cameron Low & Theo Parker.

Our final 2021-22 winners in the two "draw for partner" events, where fewer points are on offer, are Dave Butler & Bart Callaghan (South East) and Enrique Castillo Carbonell & Oscar McIntyre, who won in Scotland.

All these players make strides up the Doubles Rankings. In addition, Tom Watkinson enters the Top 10 at #10, while Ben Jourdan, Cameron Low, Lewis Keates, and Rob Whitehorn all make good progress in the Top 20.

We have 36 new entries, the most there has ever been in an updated Doubles rankings list. James Toop and Gwydion Wiseman deserve mention as the highest new entries at #27.

A lot of the new entries are young players, an encouraging feature of these latest rankings. Included in these are a clutch of new players from recent highly successful Scottish Championships. Joining the lists are Sam Park (Merchiston), Daniel Jourdan, Ronnie Brown, Xander Millar (Edinburgh Academy past and present), Malcolm Borthwick (Caledonian Club), and Dan Swinbank (City of Durham), as well as the Edinburgh Academy coach Hector McFarlane. And good performances in the National Doubles see Ashwin Ahuja and Adam Hicks rewarded with some ranking points.

Congratulations to all! We look forward to similar successes in the 2022-23 season.
